From the Principal

Welcome to our second newsletter for Term One. We have had an excellent term, and in the last few weeks have been able to progress a number of key initiatives.

Wireless Service Improvement

After protracted ongoing negotiations (16 months), we were finally successful in having our wireless service upgraded with the provision of 10 additional wireless units. This will go a long way towards addressing any wireless black spots we have, ensuring a high quality continuation of connectivity throughout the College.

College Oval Upgrade

We have also had another win with the awarding of an \$88,000 oval upgrade. This will see the dead sections of turf removed from nearly half the oval and then replaced with new turf. This will help to ensure we have an oval that is suitable for use by all students including supporting our high quality Australian Football Specialist Program as well as being able to cope with the heavy demand our growing numbers place on it.

College to be Fully Air-conditioned in 2015

I have been informed that the Department's Air Conditioning Program for our College is about to be tendered and we can expect to be fully air-conditioned before the start of next year. This is fantastic news for all students and staff.

Year 7 Building Program to Begin

The Year 7 Building Program of Works has also been scheduled, with an expectation of the building starting in July/September this year and being completed by October next year. This will be a state of the art facility that will greatly enhance the learning opportunities for our students.

Student Attendance Continues to Improve and Student Suspension Rates Continue to Decrease

The good news stories continue with another improvement in our attendance rate for Term One compared to the same time last year. We have also a marked decrease in the number of students being suspended compared to this time last year and fully expect that will continue to improve as our focus on a positive and safe college environment continues to ramp up. **Courtesy and Respect** is our current focus and this is gaining great traction with our students. Our zero tolerance to bad behaviour and bullying ensures that our College is a great place to be at all times.

Year 10 Fitness Education!

Year 10 Fitness Education was set up in 2009 as an extension of Phys Ed options available to year 10 students.



The course aims to provide an education on the components of fitness and principles of training and includes cardio vascular, muscular strength and endurance, motor fitness and flexibility. Particular attention is paid to developing these disciplines for teenagers and our main focus is exercise execution and technique.

During the year, the students can expect to complete a varied range of fitness classes including body conditioning, boxing, aerobics, combat, speed, agility and quickness (SAQ), continuous and interval training among others. Stretch and relax sessions teach the students about their own limitations and the importance of maintaining muscle function in order to reduce injury. In the last term of the course, the students are given individual personal programmes to carry out in our very own fitness suite and complete a 10km run over a period of weeks.

The course is not for the light hearted and some students have, in the past, assumed it was just another sports class. It requires commitment, dedication, energy and enthusiasm as well as an eagerness to learn about fitness and training. For those students looking for a career in gym instruction or personal training the course provides a sound knowledge base for upper school qualifications and training courses.




Vigual Arts Visits Perth Zoo

On Tuesday the 26th of March, Comet Bay College cemented its reputation as a hub of creativity with the launch of two books; "If God is a Poet" written by our Associate Dean of English, Ron Barton, and "Hatchling Heroes" by former student, Hayden Selfe. The evening began with light refreshments and casual chatter as the 50 guests, including Paul Papalia CSC, MLA Membner for Warnbro, mingled with the two authors.

Associate Principal, Stewart Pryer, was the MC for the event, entertaining the crowd with one-liners and little asides while introducing the speakers. The first of these was the amazing Chloe Forster, who was a part of our graduating class of 2012 and the artist behind the cover design for "If God is a Poet". Chloe spoke confidently and clearly about the artistic process she went through and how the image was inspired by the Hubble telescope. She said she was humbled by the opportunity given to her by Mr Barton and Ginninderra Press and hopes it is the start of a long career in art.

Ron then read from his book, engaging the audience with dramatic flair, not seen since he dressed up as an elderly woman for the year 10 extension and GATE students last year. His diverse choice of poems included pieces on amateur football, domestic violence, the way in which women manipulate men to do their bidding and his distaste in the media's sexualisation of youth.

As a form of intermission, local band "Kids With Wolves" (a trio that includes two former students) played their unique brand of folk rock to an appreciative audience. Their catchy tunes and melodic voices have recently been heard at the Mandurah Crab Fest and their performance at the book launch showed why they are the highest regarded musicians to come out of the Peel region since X-Factor's Matt Gresham.

Finally, Hayden and his mother (Dean of Student Support, Gail Nelson) took to the stage. Before reading the first chapter of his book, Hayden and Gail expressed their gratitude to those who helped Hayden through his teen years as he struggled with Asperger's on top of the usual teen issues. It was a touching display as Gail held back her tears, clearly proud of her son who had beaten adversity to become a published author.
