The banner was hung in Adelaide Terrace from 28 July until August 10.





Returning of College Owned Laptops

A reminder to all year 11 & 12 students that College owned laptops must be returned BEFORE leaving the college, as per the agreement signed by yourself and your parents. Recent correspondence from State Insurance Company Riskcover, who insure Government schools, have indicated they are willing to pursue both legal and debt recovery actions for equipment that is not returned. Debt recovery may impact credit ratings.

College Owned Laptops - Year 12 Return Shedule

Year 12 will return their College Owned Macbooks, and all accessories – powercord and any attachments etc, in the following sequence:

Non ATAR students to return by 30 August – Week 6 Term 3

ATAR students to return by 25 October – Week 2 Term 4

(ATAR is defined as a student studying four or more ATAR subjects)

Please ensure you backup the hard-drive of your laptop as they will be reimaged and all data will be lost. Unfortunately, the College is not able to offer any technical or other assistance with the laptops due to the volume being returned and the processing required. Students will not be able to attend Graduation if their allocated laptop has not been returned.

All laptops are to be returned personally to the library. Students need to collect a return form.

Purchasing of College Owned Laptops – Macbooks

I have had many enquiries from year 12 students wishing to purchase the Macbooks for a nominal price. The issuing of the Macbooks was a Federal Government initiative and as such all schools were required to asset this equipment and be audited by the Department of Education.

Under Federal Government Policy, as a College, we are required to 'maintain a fleet' this means that if we sell a laptop, regardless of the price and age, we are required to replace it to maintain the required number. The college has participated in a Technology audit annually and currently the replacement cost of a returned laptop is \$1,100.

It was a very rewarding and humbling experience, as we had the chance to talk to a number of highly-respected members of the Western Australian science community, including Lynn Beazley and Fiona Stanley. Being in a room that was filled with people who were every bit as passionate about science as we are was invigorating and inspiring, and it was really satisfying to be given the opportunity to describe how we thought the ABC might improve their communication of scientific achievement to the general public. There were many good points made by a number of individuals at times I felt the need to say "here, here" to express my agreement with a particularly good point (I managed to restrain my excitement though!). Simon Cherrimen and his wife in particular argued strongly that there is a need to create more opportunities for adolescents to have hands-on experience with science, and to get children away from the pre conceived ideas of it being about "white lab coats". I agree strongly with this view - when I took part in the BioGENEius competition in 2011/2012, I was able to experience what science was about outside of the classroom, and I believe others that are interested in the sciences should have the same opportunities that I did.

In 2015, Year 7 public school students will move to secondary school.

Fremantle teracy Centre Young Writers Day!

Last month, a selection of the year 8 GATE and extension students were given the opportunity to meet fantasy author Kirsty Murray at the Young Writer's Day. The program, run by the Fremantle Literacy Centre, is held once a term for young, talented writers and consists of tips and exercises conducted by a published author to help develop our story writing skills. We travelled up to the Literacy Centre by bus, which is situated inside of the

The day consisted of a variety of activities. First we learnt about setting the scene of the story, followed by a short creative writing time to put the tips we were taught into practice. The descriptive narratives we wrote were about places we had been before and focused mainly on targeting the five senses of the reader. We also created character profiles and learnt that figuring out the plot and the characters first helps develop the story better.

Kirsty Murray was helpful and enthusiastic; she was able to answer any questions we had on writing and publishing. We also got to meet her and some of us even had a photo taken with her at the end of the day. During breaks for lunch and recess, some of us went around the courtyard and met new people from the other schools. This definitely led to some hilarious events and lots of photos.

Everyone gained some great tips and strategies to help with our writing and we also had the chance to meet new faces. The excursion concluded with a fun bus trip back full of discussion about the day and Kirsty Murray's lessons. Like the previous authors and the many future ones we're yet to meet, we look forward to learning more and are thankful for the excellent opportunity we've been given!



Here at the College, teachers have been busily using technology to ensure we realise the College vision of providing a 21st Century education for your children. As Literacy ICT coordinator, I am privileged to work alongside many innovative educators and felt it timely to share the many wonderful things being used in classrooms around the college.

Students at CBC access learning content anywhere and at anytime. Edmodo is one popular application used by many of the teachers at the college. Most of the students in our iPad classes are very familiar with Edmodo, as their teachers use it to deliver curriculum, share resources and give students opportunities to engage in online discussions in a safe & secure setting. Many teachers and learning areas similarly use their own websites to provide both students and parents access to course outlines, homework, assignment resources and due dates.

Technology is also helping teachers promote positive behaviour. A popular application being used by many teachers is Class Dojo. Using this application, teachers are able to track student behaviour in class and automatically generate weekly reports to parents.

Video games and gaming are being used to enhance learning. Gamification is the process of applying the way video games work, and sometimes actual games themselves into a learning environment. In Society & Environment, one group of students played Age of Empires 3 to learn about medieval history while another year 9 class use an online game, Nation States to learn about politics. Meanwhile in Mathematics, students are creating board games to develop their understanding of probability and chance.

In our iPad classes, teachers are embracing student centred learning. With six iPad classes across year 8 and 9, students are using theses devices in class to enhance their learning. In Science, students use their iPads to solve problems, as one student explained, "I love that we have the ability to choose how we do things and are able to use apps we are familiar with." Using the iPad, students interpret data and present their findings in a multitude of innovative ways, including documentary film. In English, students use the devices for research, to find definitions, create presentations and short movies.
